Your sundry favours of July the 29 Decemb^r Jan^t the 4 & 28. are now before me the Creditors got nothing done till the Jan^t Offices when most of them got Judgements against the Est^t for their demands to the amount of £52.000. & in April^t Opposed there is about £8000 more which is all the demands that are against the Est^t I know of excepting Yours & Legat^t so that there is about £9000 due a prodigious sum to be sure but there is enough to pay every body if the Cred^t will give time which they will be obliged to do whether they will or not we have had several meetings to no purpose till at last proposals were fallen on which seems to be agreeable to them & which they say they will sign but how long they will be of this way of thinking time will try inclosed You have a copy of them what ever the Cred^t or the other Est^t may say of that Person he has been of the greatest service to me unimaginable & w^t out his assistance the Affairs could not have ^{been} settled & when once an Est^t Quall^y he can't resign without forswearing himself & forsaking his security Board which no body would care to do. The Estates are still advertised for sale & shall be

Your Boy I have sent him to Hampton to learn the Planting Busines under Kippendavy where he will do very well as he seems to be very good natured & well disposed I have been indeavouring to gett Miller a place in Town to no purpose & he wont goe to the Country on any Acc^t where I could have gotte him a bookkeipper's place the first day he landed, when You recommend any again ask them if they will go into the Country which if they are willing to do I may be of service to them but not otherways. I am just now favour'd w^t Yours of March the 3^r inclosing the Power of Attorney & giving me the agreeable news of Your going to Edinburgh to look out for a wife I wish with all my heart that You may succeed in getting one to Your liking & the satisfaction of Your Friends. The Boylers are arrived safe I have not seen them as they are not yet landed. They came too late for this Crop but will be in readiness for the next, there is a shippe the charming Jeany Cap. ^b belonging to Glasgow gowing round to St. Marys to load, on her I shall ship 25 hds Sugar & 10 Tuncheons of Rum for to pay her his Interest.

I was favoured ^{the} y^r of June the 4th by the Bell Day
 15 which give me great pleasure to hear of all my friends being in perfect health. You
 in great expectation of hearing that Willy had taken a life & made himself &
 Friends happy but am sorry to find that that is still to do, in my last I mentioned
 the great debts which still remain'd due on the Est^r and which can't be discharge
 ed for several years unless one of them was to be sold of which there is not any
 prospect at present owing to the prodigious distress that this Country is in
 for want of money & Credit & to add to ^{the other} misfortunes the Crop of Sugar falls qu
 ally short of what was once expected ^{from} ^{which has fallen} to prodigious Lains in one part
 Gracefull dry Weather in the other part of the Island, I expected to have made
 at Hampden 250 hhd at least & turn in proportion but we only made 206 & some
 of that very bad. & at Frontier I expected 130 hhd but I don't think that we
 shall reach 80 and the quality of the sugars bad we are at half done here & has
 made 42 hds & 25 of which are Stepping on Board the Charming Jane Cap Bar
 ranline for Glasgow with 10 Punch^r of Rum, two of which are prone applied to
 pay off Your Int^r is at 16 p^c but I hope You'll be content w^t t^r until the
 Debts are diminished. I wish to God that it was in ^{my} power to sell ^{all} ^{of} property belong
 to me in this Island for money. You may be assured that I would not hesitate one
 moment about parting w^t them & I am undervalued rather than stay from home
 where my heart & soul are but since it pleases God that it shal be otherwise

I told him it was if we could agree abt the price & the credit satisfied to if it was to be sold I told him it was for sale & that he might have it if we could agree about the price & the mode of payment agreeable to the cred^r pay the 1st of your Mortgage ann in any part of Great Britain you should desire & when the Mortgage became due that it should also be paid clear of all expenses & I was to draw up my trades Negroes, as your Mortgage is at £6 per C^t I imagined that if the sale took place the £10000 Gent^r would immediately pay off & rather than continue to pay the £6 per C^t until the Mortgage became due.

I had a valuation of the Est^r taken which amounted to £50,000 & shew'd it to the Gent^r he thought it dear but People who knew the property thought otherwise however to satisfy the cred^r secure the payment of your demand in Great Britain & to be an inducement for him to make the purchase I offered it for £42,000 which he agreed to & every body thought he had a prodigious bargain which to be sure he had if he could have accomplished it but the payments could not be made agreeable to the cred^r so there it drop^d. I am sorry the Mortgage is not to your liking it was drawn by the same hand who drew the former & as for the payment of it in Britain it could not be done but by the execu^r being the security for the payment of it there but you may depend that we shall take all the care in our power to secure the payment of your demand at home.

It vexes me greatly that the Dutch rum after so much pains taken without does not give satisfaction there was 3 or 4 large Pinches in one bunch & a great many bushions in the other, I hope the Wine turned out well, the £75 was a mistake & the £25 was a charge which I recd after the Bills was drawn, I shall send Mr Stirling a Bag of Cotton by Capt Barnabyne who sails from P^r Maria Williams Marriage gives me great pleasure & I hope the goodness of her Disposition will amend her I wish I could change Quarters with him for am almost tired of this Country

where I have neither peace of mind or body. The last Novem^r a most dangerous rebellion
broke out^{out} in S^t Marys amongst the Corromarized Negroes belonging to Sunbury Plant^r in which
I had thirty or concerned their Plan was well laid it was this, in the Months of June & July
which is the time of our dryest weather & the height of our crop in that Parish they then were
to begin their Operations (The Commander in Chief with all his under Officers & how they would
act being settled & every thing agreed on what would have been different^{the} Negroes on each
Plant^r was to set fire to that which they belonged to & surround the Houses where the White
Sleept, blow the Alarm Shells call out Fire, which would make the White People turn out
in Confusion by which means they would be easily killed & the arms on the different Plts
with the Ammunition secured then they were to Join at some place appointed for that purpose
& march through the parish & burn and destroy where ever they went if this plan had taken place God only knows what
would have been the consequences but however the Almighty to frustrate their designs, in the
manner some time about the end of Nov^r their General on Sunday had a council called ~~at~~^{to} to
which two of my People, under officers were sent by Windsor, another fellow of mine, who
was to be Capt^r of the Frontier Rebels, as Messengers & to bring him the Generals Instructions
in to their Council they had admitted very luckily for us some Corro that had been long
in the Country who were young daring fellows & warmed with Liquor, they insisted on
fighting the Bacharas (for so the term White people) that night otherwise they would des
cover the whole their General an Old Veteran who ought to have been hanged for being
concerned in the last Rebellion used many arguments to convince them of their rash
ness but all to no purpose, so early Monday morning was the time appointed for to begin
my two Fellows ^{were} dispatched away to give notice to their Capt^r & the neighbouring Com^r
to begin their operations at the same time, proceed forward & Join the General with
the forces under their command at Whitehall a Plant^r about 6 miles further up the
Country than Frontier & to which the General belonged but luckily again for us
these two fellows got drunk & Slept till day light in the first Plant^r they went to
without delivering their message by which Frontier, Albion & several other plant^r adjoin
ing on which the strength of the Corro were knew nothing of their Gen^rs intentions, so
remain quiet, the attack was made at Whitehall at the time appointed by setting fire
to the trash houses & blowing the Shells, which occasioned the Overseer & the other White
to leave the House & goe where the fire was. M^r Beckford, to whose Daughter is
the Plt^r belonged & her Bro^r ^{has} one Mr Byndloss Slept there that Night & they
upon hearing the noise ^{were} went into the Piaze, & were standing there looking at the
fire when the Negroes rushed in took possession of the House & Arms, & made poor
Byndloss to pieces M^r Beckford she jump^t over the Piaze & run to where the Corro
was standing wth the other White people & Negroes that were not concerned in the affai
endeavoring to extinguish the fire, upon which they immediately took to their hulks
& concerning they

Mr Buckford ^{they} was sent off under the care of some trusty Negroes to a Plant^t at some distance
the Overseer w^t the others went to the Plant^t near them which is ab^t ½ a mile distant
where there is a good strong house & putt them ^{them} on their guard, & after some persuasions the
Overseer of Whitehall got the other Overseer w^t his people to join him with a design to go to
Whitehall & see if they could not surprise the rebels, accordingly they went out of the house
but had not gone far before they were fired on by the rebels from amongst the Cane^s which
grew on each side of the road, ^{which} obliged them to return to the house, but without receiving any
damage where they were no sooner inted than they were closely besieged by the rebels whom
several attempts to sett fire to the House & might have succeeded in their attempts at last if they
had not lost their courage by the death of one of their most daring leaders who was killed in one
of the Attacks, his fall, day Breaking, & no Succors from the Sea Side Est^r quite confounded them
so that they seperated, the New Negroes went into the Woods where most of them indispairing
on another & partly went out after them killed the remainder the Old Dogs returned to their
respective Plant^t & as they acted this affair under the cover of Night they thought that they
would not be suspected went to their work as usuall imagining that the whole blame would
be laid on them that took to the Woods, as it realy was at first, for as it was in the Night
time that this affair hapned no body but them which ^{were} concerned (as they had all taken an oath
of Secrecy & fidelity to one another) could inform against them so they thought them selfe secure
how many was at the Attack of ^{the both} houses is not known or how farre this Rebellion which
was quashed in the Bud reached. You who I daresay is tried to this longer will see how preca-
rious our lives & fortunes are in this Country & what good reason I have to wish to home again
on the 11 of June last we had several most severe Shocks of an Earthquake they began ab^t
midnight & continued near three hours & on the 12th there was another Shock ab^t noon
I shall weary your patience no longer so conclude^d to my comp^r to Mr Stirling & Son my

he had all the Appearance this part of the Country could afford but to no purpose
he was insensible when first taken sick that he should never recover that fit of sickness

Your favour of June the 29th I recd when at the Root Weller where I saw Mark Davies who is very impatient for a payment & thinks he was to have had a remittance made to him this Year of £ 2000 hds in case there is none, for Gods sake remit him the whole next year as his cause is hard for most of the Ballance due him was cash paid on to discharge a debt due by my Bro^t to some people in Bristol as you may see by his Accts Book of his poche^s. I find there is a Ballance due to Rob^t Gell^t of £ 331.17^s. I hope you have not drawn to the full amount of the goods consigned to me of the Sugars which was first shipt from Bampfylde had come to Bristol instead of London there would have been a gain of £ 44^s in the Cwt which is a great deall being upwards of £ 230 Hds^s on 100 hds^s at 13^s by which you may plainly see the disadvantage of being mostly confined to one Market & that for 4 years past the worst in Britaine the Bristol people has this year purchased 4000 hds^s of Sugar to send to London at 14^s per Cwt cheaper than the Bristol market to supply their demands Mr Innes will be upwards of £ 4000 Hds^s in advance for the Cwt this year for which am much obliged to him for a great sum of £ 2000^s & untilt its paid Mr Innes will with a great deale of Justine expect the consignment of most of the produce thereof or will buy more not to overdraw on him any more but rather lessing the Bill^t you're getting Ruth^t to Build the Volceng^t Scareyng House pleases me much the same fort. them Simlalier assured me ready & you may remember that Drink^t w^{as} sent to the Frontier to make some bags to bring it home before I left Kingston last so^t time cant be wanting. you complaine of has been universal I believe for such continued rains, was never known in
last year, in G^t Britain. I wrote to you from London Sept^t 29 which I hope you have recd it
by Laird. I have not seen Kinc^t yett having been Confin'd here ever since Oct^t to the last
Gout, Gravel & bad weather its now very cold & the ground intirely coverd to snow. I also
wrote to you by Capt^t Robinson sometime in Aug^t I think acquainting you at Kinc^t down
that you might take your own time of paying your debt, but he expected punctually the
mittances to be made for discharging the Mortgage Interest which I hope you will
do as also mine. I am much afraid that the debts will never be paid unless by selling the lot

Jamaica & intended then to sett out for thence this insuing Oct^r but whether he continues
the same way of thinking I know not am glad to hear by M^r Matheson that Walter Murray
has lighted on a good purchase for him which will hasten him over I suppose I wish he may
find his speech therfor I am told that his dumb here I must confess that there is not that
freedom here which is so agreeable to our Liberties way of acting in Jamaica but that to owing
to the men being more in comp^y to the fair Sex here which is a pleasure far superior to any
of ours in Jamaica, no doubt but there are wth you a great many worthy People but you have all
so your selfish greedy interested Gen^l too & who some who under pretence of generosity act wth
an intention to deceive, their good & bad country where I heard of no such thing as Do Gordon mur-
der to you at Albion & Edin & I saw the Elector of Hannover, who manages that affair for
the concerned, since Gordon left England, & he told me no such thing, I was informed by a gen^l

Dined two States of the Debt to Mess^{rs} La Salle & Maxwell one as made out by Bowan &
Murray who insisted on deducting £50 Sterling for the Haroys Commission on the Two
Scrip Bills & on having also the advantage of the Exchange Intc^t of £C^t on that Bill by
means of which they would have another Commission on the 1st Bill for their own
benefit on the 2nd Bill to the accumulated charges on it. The other is as stated by my Bro^r
Bob^t who gave the Haroys that Bill at their preying desire & solicitation & tho' he had
not effects in M^r Setons hands was in expectation from Setons Lds that he might proba-
bly pay it, & had taken a conditional receipt from Mess^{rs} Haroys for the Bill not desiring
to have Credit for it untill paid. I also recd a Bill from my Bro^r to you of the 30th Oct 1765
which not having been forwarded before he was Seised to his last Sicknes, was found
after his death, inclosing a Bill of Dch^t of M^r Laings on M^r Perrin for £511, 15, 2d late
Mess^{rs} Bowan & Murray had refused this Bill & had brought Actions against my Bro^r
