

Travelling displays Free-standing



Listed below is our range of exhibitions that can be displayed in community venues such as libraries, shopping centres and community centres. Dimensions included.

● Caley

Do you remember the days of steam engines and locomotives? This exhibition celebrates the life of Glasgow's Caledonian Railway Works where these great giants of the railways were once built, repaired and maintained. Created in partnership with ex-employees of the works, this display explores the group's memories of the yards.

Dimensions: 1 metre wide x 65cm deep x 1.4 metres high.

● Crannog

Crannogs were houses on stilts once built in the shallow waters of Scotland's lochs. Created by members of the Pollok Kist Local History group, this fantastic display of a model Crannog sheds light on these ancient water dwellings and the people who called them home.

Dimensions: 73cm wide x 1 metre deep x 1.3 metres high.

● Dzień Dobry

Celebrating the history of Glasgow's Polish community, this display takes a look at their colourful traditional crafts.

Dimensions: 53cm wide x 11cm deep x 1.5 metres high.

● Football Fans' Bus

With rattles and scarves, mince pies and Bovril this display could only be about one thing. Created by young people from the Castlemilk Youth Complex this exhibition is a fun exploration of what it means to be a football fan in Glasgow.

Dimensions: 113cm wide x 151.5cm deep x 1.37 metres high.

● Hippo Skull

Have you ever seen a hippo yawn? Now's your chance: imagine what it would be like by admiring our hippo's skull - it's huge!

Dimensions: 66cm wide x 1 metre deep x 1.35 metres high.

● Incarnations of Vishnu

This beautiful exhibition explores the ten different earthly forms of Vishnu, the Hindu god. Learn about his different incarnations including Matsya, a fish who saved the earth from drowning and Varaha, a boar who raised it up using its tusks.

Dimensions: 73cm wide x 80cm deep x 1.25 metres high.

● Jukebox Jury

You wore the clothes, you modelled the hairstyles, and you loved the music. Now it's time to show off your moves! From the Bay City Rollers to David Bowie this disco-tastic display explores memories of pop music in Glasgow throughout the decades.

Dimensions: 85cm wide x 60cm deep x 1.4 metres high.

- **Keep on Trucking**

Peacocks, tigers and elephants...A group of writers and artists from HMP Barlinnie uncovered the inspiration behind Indian truck art to create this vibrant exhibition. Inspired by Glasgow Museums' new acquisitions, funded by the Art Fund's RENEW scheme.

Dimensions: 1.2 metres wide x 73cm deep x 1.2 metres high.

- **Lifecycle**

Giving new life to old drink cans, plastic bags and telephone wires this display of recycled artworks created by the Kennishead Women's Group is a celebration of creativity and traditional skills.

Dimensions: 72cm wide x 72cm deep x 1.5 metres high.

- **Mystery of the Scarab Pendant**

Walk like an Egyptian with this fascinating display! Filled with real shabtis, scarab beetles and canopic jars, this exhibition, created in partnership with Cardonald College's ESOL Outreach class, will give you an exotic taste of ancient Egypt.

Dimensions: 65cm wide x 70cm deep x 1.5 metres high.

- **Past-times: the home and leisure of yesteryears**

Whether it was a night out at the dancing, a trip to the pictures or an afternoon in listening to the wireless, this exhibition was created by members of the Castlemilk Pensioners Action Centre to explore the many pastimes of yesteryear.

Dimensions: 70cm wide x 70cm deep x 1.7 metres high.

- **Sargam**

An exhibition of musical instruments from across Southern Asia, this colourful display gives a taste of the region's rich musical heritage: ranging from centuries old classical traditions to modern day bhangrha bagpipes.

Dimensions: 1.66 metres wide x 1.15 metres deep x 1.34 metres high.

Travelling displays Tabletop

Listed below is our range of exhibitions that can be displayed on a table in smaller community venues. Dimensions included.

● **Alternative Currency**

Did you ever use a jeely jar to get in to the pictures or come across canoe-shaped money? Explore the varied methods of payment used at different times across the world in this small but fascinating display, made in partnership with the Castlemilk Timebank.

Dimensions: 55cm wide x 55cm deep x 40cm high.

● **Enigma 1**

Was it used for storing secret treasures or keeping granny's stash of mint humbugs? Have lots of fun guessing what these unusual and strange objects are. They're designed to perplex and bewilder!

Dimensions: 40cm wide x 40cm deep x 70cm high.

● **The Badger and the Water Vole**

One has dashing black and white stripes, while the other is a brown fuzzy ball. The first likes to come out at night, yet the other prefers the light. Get to know them both together in this display and learn some interesting facts about our badger and vole.

Dimensions: 50cm wide x 80cm deep x 40cm high.

● **The Disappearing Squirrel**

Once found in large numbers across Scotland's woodlands, the red squirrel is now an endangered species in Britain. This display creates awareness of factors that threaten these beautiful creatures' survival and the efforts being made to preserve them.

Dimensions: 61cm wide x 61cm deep x 30cm high.

● **In Time**

Time fills our days, yet we can't see, touch, taste, hear or smell it. A group of men in HMP Barlinnie explored how the passing of time shows its face in these everyday objects, from the tick of a clock to the final whistle blowing at a football match.

Dimensions: 62cm wide x 42 cm deep x 40 cm high.

● **Sandstone**

Look around the streets of Glasgow - at the houses, shops and schools. It won't take long to see why it's a city famous for its red and blonde sandstone; but have you ever wondered where it all comes from? This display holds the answers, as it takes us on a geological journey from quarry to tenement.

Dimensions: 1 metre wide x 70cm deep x 30cm high.
