b) Reason for Change in Policy or Policy Development

Tramway closed in March 2020 as a result of the COVID 19 pandemic and in line with Scottish Government direction. During this time Tramway has:

- Continued to develop Making the Change plans, including recruiting for a freelance producer
- Developed an online service: Tramway TV
- Developed plans and funding bids to present work out with the building to engage audiences in safer environments until the building reopens ad to compliment future plans and targeting.
- Developed a phased reopening approach to reopen the building in line with demand and safety.

In line with recent and evolving government guidelines, (Phase 3 of Scottish Government Route Map) Tramway is preparing to re-open to staff and to the public.

This phased approach will also include a temporary reduction in opening hours. The volume of activity and number of events will be significantly reduced because they will not be financially viable. A booking system will be implemented in line with track and trace.

In line with COVID19 Risk Assessments Tramway will gradually reintroduce programme and services initially focusing on the following:

- Accommodate and facilitate tenant activity
- Accommodate and facilitate artists rehearsals

- Install an exhibition and de-install previous exhibitions
- Acts as a base for off-site work

Activities involving members of the public will only take place once Government Guidelines allow and suitable operational measures have been put in place. It is therefore anticipated that there will be limited opening of the building for small public events and exhibitions with minimum audiences from September/October 2020.

Tramway will continue to

- Continued to deliver the Making the Change strategy (Making the Change strategy Tramway has been developing work focused on artists of colour as either producers or artists of a programmed body of ongoing plans.)
- Continue to deliver Tramway TV

(Tramway TV is a developing digital offer to support artists and audiences to remain connected to contemporary art during lockdown. Tramway TV removes many barriers to access and gives some access to cultural activities.

• Developed plans and funding bids to present work out with the building to engage audiences in safer environments until the building reopens and to compliment future plans and targeting.

Please note: This assessment may change over time in direct response to future Scottish Government directives relating to the phasing of lifting or re-imposing of lockdown regulations.

c) List main outcome focus and supporting activities of the Policy, Project, Service Reform or Budget Option

Tramway provides services to tenants, artists, the sector, local communities and programmed content as agreed with Creative Scotland in a funding agreement.

The primary focus for Tramway is to carefully scale up activity delivered focusing on artists, tenants and the sector.

In line with the COVID19 Risk Assessment operational adjustments are being undertaken to adapt the building in terms of opening hours and access as well as implementing safety systems and procedures including staff training.

Scaling up of activity gradually will impact on everyone in some way as there will be less cultural activity and some adjustments to access.

Throughout lockdown Tramway has continued to develop programme themes including the Making the Change strategy and has adapted resource to create an online programme called Tramway TV and to develop plans for off-site work in local communities, using the venue as a future base for this work.
