Pinkston: Then & Now

Pinkston (built 1900-1901) was so critical to the functioning of Glasgow as a city, that camouflage paint was applied to the building during World War 2 in order to avoid its destruction in bombing raids.
Between 1952-54, a cooling tower (pictured) was built for the power station, which was the largest ever constructed in Europe at the time. The project cost £100,000 to complete and the power station was responsible for both the subway and the trams.





The new home of Scottish watersports was officially completed in May 2014 at a cost of £3.25 million. The aim of the centre was to offer something for everyone; a training facility for elite athletes on the artificial white water course, a venue for regular paddlesport club and open water swimming sessions, a water safety training resource for the Scottish Fire Service and Royal Life Saving Society and a community hub providing the opportunity for local people – whether beginners or seasoned enthusiasts – to get out on the water.
